

Superintendent's note

Welcome back to CSCS, where we continue to focus on "Creating Successful Citizens Striving to make a Difference!"

The opening of the 2016-17 school year is an exciting time, especially since we are coming off a very successful 2015-16 school year. District celebrations from the past school year include:

- Being named a Bronze Medal Jr./Sr. High School by *US News and World Report*
- Achieving a graduation rate of 94 percent on the most recent New York State Report Card
- Attaining a passing average of 89 percent on all high school Regents examinations
- Showing significant improvement on our grade 3-8 ELA and math state test results. C-S students exceeded the average student performance for upstate districts. This ranks our district well above the average for all upstate districts in New York State on grade 3-8 ELA and math student achievement.

We will not, of course, rest on our laurels. During the 2016-17 school year, we will continue to strive to improve the education

and extracurricular opportunities we provide for our students, always with our vision on ensuring that each of our students reaches his or her highest potential and graduates prepared to be a successful citizen.

What we are looking forward to at C-S for 2016-17

A District Long Range Plan:

Developing a new District Long Range Plan was a major focus of last school year. Our School Improvement Planning (SIP) Team surveyed our teaching and support staff to identify areas to be included in the plan. The team identified student achievement and the social emotional growth of each child as areas of focus for the plan. In July, the SIP Team met to review student achievement and social and emotional data and to develop goals to address these areas. The C-S Long Range Plan will help us keep a consistent focus on measurable and ever-increasing student achievement results. We look forward to presenting this plan to our staff, Board of Education and parents in September. Once approved by the Board, the C-S Long Range Plan will be posted on our

website for all of our community to review.

Welcoming 15 new staff members:

Several staff members retired or resigned during the spring and summer. In addition, this fall we are bringing back several of our special education students who had previously been educated in BOCES programs. As a result, we will welcome 15 new staff members to start the school year. Look to the November issue for articles on our new staff members. As of press time, we are still hiring.

Increased wireless access and the integration of technology into our classrooms: We are continuing to expand the access to technology for all students and staff. The District is using our Smart Schools state grant to purchase more laptops and tablets. We are also increasing our wireless access throughout both buildings.

The excitement for the beginning of school has been building ever since our amazing Kindergarten students walked the gymnasium floor the last day of school in June! Within the first week of summer, teachers were coming in to start preparing for the next year with an intensity and excitement that can only come from a shared belief that students are our highest priority and every decision we make is centered around what they need to be successful. This enthusiasm continued with our students, as we had three fully-staffed primary summer school classrooms and almost 100 students engaged in our third through eighth grade summer school and Base A3 summer programs.

Some of the incredible work done during the summer focused on our PBIS framework and how our school ROARS (Respect, Ownership, Attitude, Responsibility and Safety) to meet not only the academic, but also the social and emotional needs of our students. We have an exciting kick-off assembly coming up the first week of school and will be celebrating our ROARS for success. We encourage parents and the community to learn about and support our ROARS framework. As we have done in the past, parents and students will be able to drop off their school supplies, briefly meet their child's teacher

and enjoy our PTO Ice Cream Social on Tuesday, September 6, the day before school begins. Students in PreK through second grade can drop off their school supplies and visit their teachers from 4:00-4:30 p.m., and students in third through sixth grade can drop off their school supplies and visit their teachers between 4:30-5:00 p.m. We will also have a bus parked outside so that children who have never ridden the bus before can have the chance to review the bus rules and expectations to become a little more comfortable for the first day of school. The PTO is sponsoring a make your own ice cream sundae in the cafeteria for all who attend. The PTO does so much for our school in supporting field trips and family and community events. Cans and bottles to be collected for fundraiser

Start saving your five cent returnable cans and bottles for a new fundraiser this school year! Campbell-Savona's high school classes will participate in a competitive fundraiser during the week of Homecoming, October 3-8. You can help the seniors fund their senior trip, help the juniors fund their prom or help the sophomore and freshman classes build their general fund for all of the above.

There will be four collection bins in the parking lot by the athletic fields marked for each class. You can drive in, drop off your bottles and cans, and head on your way. It's easy!

We plan to accept many, many cans during this week-long competition. The class that receives the most cans and bottles will receive the majority of the money. The rest of the winnings will be divided up among the other classes. The amount raised will be divided as follows:

1st Place	65%
2nd Place	20%
3rd Place	10%
4th Place	5%

We ask that all cans and bottles be rinsed before being dropped off at the school. All five cent returnables will be accepted.

Our goal is that this will be a friendly yet competitive fundraiser and that the community, staff and students will rally behind their classes to help support them in their future costs.

BASE update

BASE A-3 (Boosting After School Experience by Aligning Aspirations and Actions) offered programming for five weeks this summer, with more than 80 students from Campbell-Savona and Bradford attending. The students participated in Mr. McKenna's and Mrs. Wright's academic enrichment programs to help them maintain their reading and math skills. For their efforts spent reading, Pro Action of Steuben and Yates provided students with a free book and an ice cream sundae party. During the remaining time, Ms. Chaffee, Ms. Towner, Ms. Durham and Ms. Rosko offered active enrichment programs and recreation. Mr. Heywood and Mr. Coffed ran the SciFair program, where students built a virtual world modeling Yellowstone National Park.

Everyone involved appreciated the time and effort spent by the teachers this summer. We hope that many more students can take advantage of this great opportunity next year.

The BASE A-3 school year program will begin on September 26. Complete information will be available at family events and orientations at the beginning of the school year and sent home with students the first week of school. Summer school recap

In July, 162 Campbell-Savona students in grades K-12 returned to school for enrichment and opportunities to regain high school credits, review for exams and retake Regents exams. Students also were provided with free breakfast and lunch from the Food Bank of the Southern Tier's food program.

Students entering grades K-2 attended summer school at Savona Elementary School. There were three classes with a total of 44 students. The classes focused on two themes this summer: oceans and Olympics. Teachers created interactive and engaging activities that allowed students to have continued practice in basic reading, writing and math skills.

Fifty-five students in grades 3-8 participated in an enrichment period with Mrs. Laura Wright and Mr. Joe McKenna as a component of the BASE A3 program and Regional Summer School. During the enrichment hour, students worked

on math fact fluency, independent reading, reading aloud and practicing prerequisite skills for their upcoming school year.

Grades 7-12 attended summer school at Campbell-Savona Jr./Sr. High School. The program lasted six weeks, with an additional two days for retaking Regents exams. The program included credit recovery courses, Regents review courses, virtual learning courses and driver education. A total of 63 students in grades 7-12 were enrolled in summer school for either credit recovery or Regents review. Out of the 63 students enrolled, 18 participated in virtual learning (online) courses. These courses offered a blended learning format with both virtual and teacher instruction. At the conclusion of the program, 50 Campbell-Savona students enrolled in the opportunity to improve their performance on Regents exams.

Helpful tips for applying to college

During the fall, high school seniors begin the important task of applying to colleges. Although some students will choose to apply to only one college, it may be to your advantage to apply to several. Regardless of the number of colleges you choose to apply to, the following process will help you avoid confusion and unnecessary delays. Here are some simple steps to help guide you through the college application process.

- If you still have a couple of colleges to visit, the fall is a good time to do that, as classes will be in session and the college campuses are

alive with people in many different activities. You might even find yourself sitting in a class lecture or having a conversation with a professor.

- You will need to start narrowing down which colleges you are interested in applying to. You will need to do your homework on each school so you have an idea which ones might be a good fit. Talk with your parents, role models, teachers and guidance counselors for advice and ideas.

- Make sure that you have done the activities and earned the grades that you want on your college ap-

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From the Health Office

Annual Required Physicals

All new students and students in grades PreK, K (if first year in school), 2, 4, 7 and 10 are required by the NYS Department of Health to have a physical done by a New York state licensed practitioner. The physical may be completed by your child's private physician or it can be completed at school by one of our practitioners from Guthrie Steuben Medical. If you choose to have your physician do the physical, we will need a form completed by the doctor and returned to the Health Office by December 1, 2016. The forms can be found on the school website at www.ccsd.org under Departments, Health Office or at either of the school health offices.

Required Sixth Grade Vaccinations

All sixth grade students are required to have a Tdap vaccine at the time they turn 11 years old. If your sixth grade student is already 11 years old, he/she must get the vaccine immediately. If your sixth grade student will be turning 11 years old, he/she is required to get the vaccine within 14 days. The school nurse must receive documentation of the vaccine from the doctor or clinic giving the vaccine.

All sixth graders are now required to have **two** varicella (chicken pox) vaccines. If your sixth grade student has had only one varicella vaccine, he or she will be required to get a second one immediately.


New Immunization Requirement For Grades 7 and 12

New York State Public Health Law section 2164 requires children entering or attending seventh and twelfth grades on or after September 1, 2015 to receive an adequate dose or doses of vaccine against meningococcal disease as recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

The ACIP recommendations for meningococcal vaccine are:

- A single dose of vaccine against meningococcal serogroups A, C, W-135, and Y (MenACWY vaccine – brand names Menactra® or Menveo®) should be administered to all adolescents at age 11 or 12 years.
- A second (booster) dose of MenACWY vaccine should be administered at age 16 years. The booster dose is not necessary for adolescents who receive the first dose of MenACWY at 16 years of age or older. The minimum interval between doses of MenACWY vaccine is eight weeks.

Please don't wait to schedule an appointment for these required vaccines! Call your child's health-care provider today!

Transportation news

At C-S, we regularly re-evaluate our policies and procedures to ensure the safety of all children. During the summer, our transportation department researched procedures regarding the dropping off of primary-aged students with the assurance that an adult is present. As a result of this research, the Board of Education has approved a change in the Transportation of Students policy. According to the new policy, children in Pre-K through third grade must be met at their stop by a parent or guardian, other person identified by the parent or by an older sibling who rides the same bus. The bus driver must have visual contact with this person or the child will not be allowed to get off the bus and the child will be taken back to the bus garage to be picked up by a parent. Please note that bus drivers cannot wait for long periods of time at a stop or use the horn on the bus to alert parents, so please be courteous and be prepared for the arrival of the bus.

From the Food Service Dept.

One of the most important ways we can help our children perform better in the classroom is to provide them with the nutrition necessary for the healthy growth of their minds and bodies. The School Food Service Program offers students breakfast and lunch in both the Elementary and Jr./Sr. High School buildings. Menus are available at each building for students to take home and on our district website at www.cscsd.org.

Pre-payment is strongly recommended. Campbell-Savona has a pre-payment online option called Pay Schools, which can be accessed by logging into the school website and following the Pay Schools link. Parents may call our office at any time to request account balances and account histories, both of which can be printed out and mailed home.

Students are allowed to charge up to three meals. After charging three meals, students will receive a call home and an alternate meal will be provided. There is no charging allowed for a la carte snacks. This includes morning snack milk. Snacks can be limited by sending a note from home to the cafeteria office. For example, if you would

like your child to have a snack only on Fridays, send in a note with your name and phone number, your child's name and teacher, and your request "snack only on Friday" to the cafeteria office.

Free and reduced-price meals are available for children whose household income meets Federal Income Guidelines. If your child qualified for free or reduced-price meal prices last year, you are still required to fill out and return a 2016-17 application or your direct certification letter as soon as possible for that to continue. Applications for free or reduced-price meals are inserted in the school calendar and are available on the school web site and anytime during the school year by calling the cafeteria office. If your family's income changes, a family member becomes unemployed or if your family size increases, contact the cafeteria office anytime during the year to submit an application. Applications will be kept confidential. For more information or an application, contact Food Service Manager Pam Drumm or Assistant Manager Julie Mitchell at 527-9832.

plication. If you want to get involved in soccer or drama club, it's not too late. Get involved now.

- If you still need to take the SAT or ACT exams, now is the time. You can register online at collegeboard.org or actstudent.org. Make sure that you have your scores sent to the colleges that you are applying to.
- Some colleges and scholarships will require up to three letters of recommendation from people other than your relatives. Recommendation letters highlight your abilities, attitude, talents and personality so that review committees can make decisions. You should ask teachers, coaches, counselors, employers, etc. for letters of recommendation as soon as you know you will need them. This will give the person ample time to prepare them.
- Pay close attention to deadlines and timelines. Colleges may receive thousands of applications by their deadline, so they won't be interested in adding to that pile after their deadline has passed. You will hate to miss out on any special opportunities because you were a day late in applying.
- Work closely and communicate frequently with your guidance counselor. Mr. Burns is available to help seniors stay on track through their senior year. You should keep him posted on what colleges you have applied to and what scholarships you are looking for so that he can assist as necessary by sending out necessary transcripts or letters.

- **Academic Watch List** letters will be sent home at the end of every five-week period beginning October 14. The letters indicate any course with a student's average below 70.
